ply last year.

So far as seed corn seed goes, there will be no serious shortage, but some of the more popular numbers are already sold out. We have already sold more seed corn than we sold all last year. Sales of DeKalb corn in the entire central Pennsylvania district are above the total for last year, and the orders are still coming in.

Short supplies of hay will continue to make the alfalfa seed situation more serious. The squeeze will come next summer when farmers begin to order for fall seeding. One bright spot is the good supply of grass seeds, and some farmers may be forced into going more to grass than legumes for hay.

All in all, 1963 looks very encouraging for us personally. Our sales in all kinds of seeds are running ahead of last year. We will continue to supply farmers with high quality seeds as long as they are available.

Most areas of the County lacked enough moisture in 1962 to produce good crops. This will be felt by some, in loss of crops for sale, while many others find themselves short on grains and roughage for their poultry and livestock. In a year that finds feed prices much higher than in 1962, many of our farmers need to buy more feed with little chance of receiving more for their main products, and the possibility in some cases of receiving lower prices. Their requirements of field seeds will be high in cost, and most operating costs will in-

all probability continue to creep higher. This will make it essential for every farmer to analyze his operations and economize wherever possible.

It would appear that 1963 would be a year many of our farmers will need more financial assistance than in a normal year. Therefore, most farmers who will be needing assistance will be contacting their financial institutions early in the year to discuss their requirements for the year and set up a line of credit, so

that when they get into the planting period and the busy seasons of the year, they will have a complete program mapped out for their year's operation.

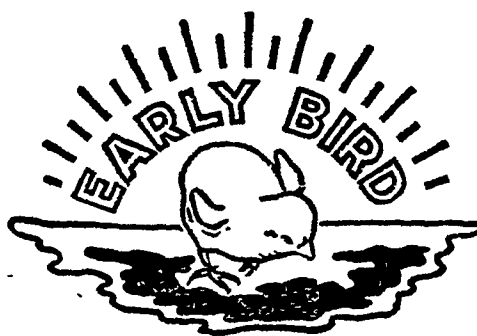

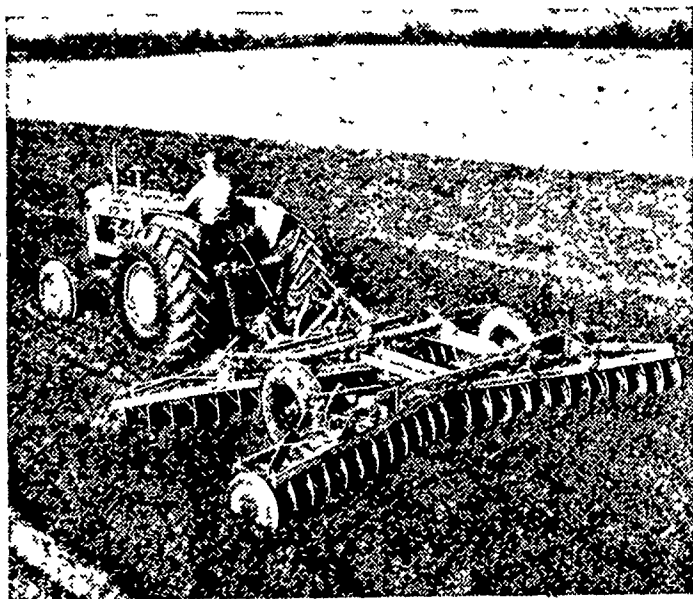
