## Co. Soil Conservation District Directors List 1962 Activities

Activities of the Lancaster County Soil Conservation District were varied and numerous during 1962. The following list of activities was prepared by Henry E. Givler, secretary of the district.

1. The outstanding Conservation Farmer was Abram Zeiset, New Holland R1.
2. A total of 257 attended the Annual Banquet at Quarryville.
3. During May Soil Stewardship was observed. Seven papers carried Stewardship articles, and several of the rural Churches used Soil Stewardship materials.
4. A tour of County Farms was held for the County Commissioners.
5. Director and Chairman Amos Funk served as State Vice President.
6. Director and Chairman Amos Funk has been elected President of the State Association for the coming year.
7. The 3rd Annual Plowing Contest was sponsored by the District on the Roy Gaiber farm. There were 10 contestants and approximately 250 spectators. J. Everett Kreider, Quarryville R D No 1 was the County winner and was sponsored by the district in the State Contest.
8. The District also started a rotating Plowman trophy (which must be won three times for permanent possession).
9. The 3rd Annual Field Day was held on the farm of Gerald Darlington, Lititz R D No. 2.
10. Four Watershed Meetings were held at Bainbridges Farmersville, Paradise, and Manheim.
11. A district representative attended meetings and participated in the programs of the Lancaster County Agriculture Council.
12. The district continues to be a sponsor of the Silt Sampling Station on the Conestoga Creek.
13. District sponsored seven Television programs.
14. The district provided a plaque to the FFA boy who won the Land Use and Management Contest in the County.
15. Sponsored a workshop for Associate Directors in planning the Watershed meetings.
16. The directors purchased the new Conservation film "Beyond Tomorrow".
17. The film has been shown at four Service Organizations, three Sportsman Clubs, three Farm Organizations, ten Vocational Agriculture Departments in Lancaster County, nine Vo-

ational Agriculture Departments in York County and one Jr and Sr High School Assembly Program.

18. Farmer Cooperators in the County now total 2105.

19. There were 92 new Cooperators signed during the year with acreage totaling 7,916 acres.

20. Held 12 regular monthly meetings. Directors attendance was 81.6%.

Lancaster County with 13,650 brown trout, 6,720 rainbow trout, 8,220 brook trout for a total of 28,590 legal sized trout, distributed approximately 25,000 fingerling trout to sportsmen's clubs and also stocked through out the county; stocked the Susquehanna River in the vicinity of Columbia with

2000 muskellunge; investigations made in regards to channel changes, also pollution cases in conjunction with the Health dept; cooperated with farm pond owners and issued permits for chemical treatment of ponds for algae and weed control. Surveys made on the Susquehanna River.
