**ZESTY BLUE CHEESE MEAL-IN-ONE**  
 10 ounce package frozen green vegetable (spinach, broccoli, or beans)  
 2 tablespoons butter  
 2 tablespoons flour  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1 cup milk  
 Four drops hot pepper sauce  
 3/4 to 1/2 cup crumbled Blue cheese  
 4 hard-cooked eggs, shelled and sliced

Cook green vegetable according to directions on package. Drain. Melt butter in a saucepan, blend in flour and salt. Add milk gradually, stirring constantly until thick and bubbly. Add hot pepper sauce, cheese, and 3 sliced eggs. Heat for 1 minute. Pour sauce over drained vegetable. Garnish with slices of remaining eggs. 4 servings.

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
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
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
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
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
