processing plants, to regulate milk manufacturing plants, promote farm products and protect watersheds. He said the funds requested by the Foods and Chemistry bureau will permit no new work by that bureau at a time when food additives, and the greater use of pesticides has put increased burdens on the bureau.

Bull said, however, there is a \$100,000 appropriation set aside for work on the soil survey being conducted throughout the state.

The farm show building, which is in need of new heating, electrical equipment and paint will be hurt the most. Requests for furniture and equipment for the new office and laboratory building were cut from his budget.

"If the new building is ready for occupancy in June of 1964 as planned," he told the dealers, "we wouldn't be able to occupy the structure until money is appropriated for future and equipment in fiscal year 1964-65."

In response to a question about the future of farming in Penna. Bull indicated big changes, "perhaps from traditional farming as we now know it to a whole new field of agriculture including tree and fish propagation farming."

He said he was hopeful that the department could develop a promotion of farm products to tie in with the governor's "Pride in Pennsylvania Program."

The Lancaster regional feed dealers meeting, headed by Robert Graybill, Miller and Bushong, Inc., Rohrerstown, was one of nine held throughout Pennsylvania by the association.

Egg Auction Shows Growth

William G. Carlin, president of Producers Cooperative Exchange reported at the last Directors Meeting, first six months earning position was well ahead of a year ago by 70.8% increase. Working capital continues to increase each month.

Dollar sales were up by 3-3% and expenses decreased by 3.8%.

Receipts of members eggs are above a year ago and a higher percentage are being plant graded.

A second shift is now operating on the new grading and packaging machine. The equipment is working well, it is much faster and more efficient. The most outstanding feature on this equipment is the electronic blood spot detector, it is much more accurate than hand candling.

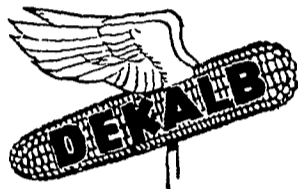

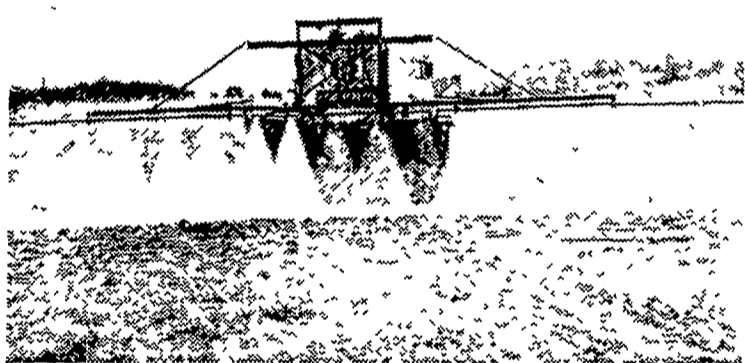
