

Solanco Future Farmers Win Regional Contest

Lancaster County's entry in the Region II FFA Parliamentary Procedure contest beat out all competition in the 12 county southeastern Pennsylvania region Thursday to win a shot at the state title.

A sharp, confident team of eight Future Farmers from Solanco exhibited skills in conducting a meeting according to "Roberts Rules Of Order".

They will compete for state honors during FFA Week at the Pennsylvania State University in June.

Glenn Weber, Mohnton R2, a member of the Glasslands Chapter FFA, New Holland, took third place in the Public Speaking contest held in conjunction with the Parliamentary Procedure demonstration in the Millersville State College.

Glenn, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Weber, is a ninth grade student in vocational agriculture at the Garden Spot High School. He had placed second with his speech, "The Race Between Food and People," in the York-Lancaster area contest on April 8. His placing on Thursday won for him a second alternate position in the state public speaking contest during FFA Week.
