Co. Farmers Put Corn Crops Under Loan

Farmers in Lancaster County had put 4771 bushels of 1962-crop corn under price-support loans and purchase agreements through April Fred Seidomridge, Chairman Lancaster County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, has announced. This compares with 1599 bushels of the 1961 corn crop which were covered by the support program as of the end of April a year ago.

Farmers had until May 31 to put 1962-crop corn under support, and the loan maturity date is July 31. Loan maturity dates for all other grains have passed except for soybeans, for which the loan repayment date was extended to July 31.

Throughout the country, 1962-crop corn put under price-support loans and purchase agreements through April totaled almost 532 million bushels. A year earlier, 548.5 million bushels of 1961-crop corn had been put under support as of the same date. Of the 1962-crop corn under support, almost 450 million bushels were under farm-stored loans.

Certified Egg Program Grows

HARRISBURG — Five years of Pennsylvania's certified quality control egg program were completed in April with a new high volume and a consistent record of month-by-month gains, E. J. Lawless, poultry division chief in the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Markets, reported today.

Starting in 1958 with four plants participating, the program has grown to 42 plants. Others are expected to qualify and participate.

From a beginning of 168,000 dozens, the sales of certified eggs now exceed 25 million dozens per month.

For the five-year period, sales have totaled 4,008,162 cases or 120,244,860 million dozens, an average of 801,632 cases per year.

The program is on a fee basis and monthly income now exceeds \$1,000, with a five-year total of \$43,023, or an average of \$8,604 per year.
