

## Brinton and Eager Have Top Cow; Eshelman High Average in DHIA

A registered Holstein cow in the herd of Brinton and Eager, Quarryville, completed the highest 305 day lactation in the Red Rose Dairy Herd Improvement Association in April Lena, a four year old cow had 19,505 pounds of milk and 759 pounds of butterfat.

Highest herd during the month was the 26 registered

Holsteins of James M. Eshelman, Mount Joy R2. The herd averaged 1,666 pounds of milk and 65 pounds of butterfat with an average of 3.9 per cent test.

Second high lactation was made by a registered Holstein owned by John C. Groff, Quarryville R2. She had 17,036 pounds of milk and 757 pounds

of butterfat. Hess and Grosh, Mount Joy R1 had the second high average of 1,612 pounds of milk and 64 pounds of butterfat for each of their 21 registered Holsteins.

Seven other cows finished lactations with more than 700 pounds of butterfat. They were in the herds of Ezra M. Martin, Dan S. Stoltzfus, Nolt Brothers, Henry E. Kettering, Ernest J. Sauder, and John S. Shelly.

Other herds with 60 or more

pounds of butterfat average belonged to John E. Esh, Melvin G. Stoltzfus, J. Richard Keller, Albert E. Fry, Harry K. Shenk, John B. Stoltzfus, Melvin Perfer, David H. Breckbill, Jacob L. Kurtz, Amos B. Lapp, and Vincent H. Hoover.

A "thank you" card was received from Robert Grotz, club leader, who received a basket of fruit from the club after a recent injury.

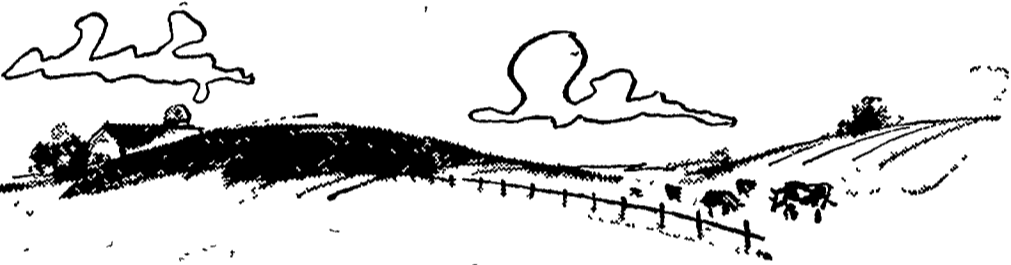
Next meeting of the club will be held at 8 p.m. July 2, at the home of Paul Werser, Quarryville R1.

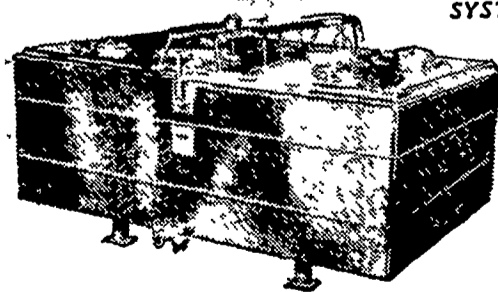
