Milk and Dairy Products

Milk is the best source of calcium in the diet, reminds Louise Hamilton, Penn State extension nutrition specialist. As all dairy products, it contributes protein, riboflavin, and other vitamins. Whole milk products supply vitamin A. Regardless of his age, everyone needs some milk every day.

Milk Production Highest Ever

HARRISBURG — The Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service today reported May milk production in the state at 728 million pounds for the highest May total of record. It was up seasonally 13 per cent from the previous month, up 5 per cent from May, 1962, and up 8 per cent above the 1957-61 average.

It was 228 million pounds above May, 1944, and 107 million pounds higher than the estimate for May, 1954. The number of milk cows on farms during May was estimated at 859,000, or 1,000 less than the previous month and 13,000 fewer than for May of last year.

Output per cow on Pennsylvania farms was estimated at 847 pound for the month.

For the first five months of 1963 monthly milk production per cow has averaged about 64 pounds per month higher than the comparable months in 1961.

During the 18-year period 1944-62 the May output per cow has increased from 531 pounds to 797 pounds—an increase of 50 per cent, or about 2.8 per cent annually.

Don't Over-Agitate Tanks

Many dairymen are over-agitating milk in bulk tanks, warns Ivan Parkin, Penn State extension dairy specialist. Because of this, flakiness develops and changes the milk's physical structure. To prevent this, Parkin recommends dairymen put enough milk into the tank so agitation will not destroy milk's characteristics. Don't put the compressor in to motion on direct expansion tanks because freezing milk also causes flaking. And, he adds, be sure cold milk in a tank is moving before adding any warm milk.
