Tobacco users can spread mosaic virus disease to tomato plants they handle, warns Allen Bauer, Penn State extension plant pathologist. The virus occurs in many tobaccos, and Bauer urges farm workers not to use tobacco while handling tomato plants and to wash hands with soap and water before doing such work.
