Most Boys Ever In Voc. Agri.

A report from the Agricultural Education Branch of the U.S. Office of Education says that more boys than ever before are studying vocational agriculture in high school. Enrollment in vo-ag usually closely parallels total membership in the Future Farmers of America which, for the 1962-63 school year hit a new high of 395.812. Membership this past year was 7,820 more than in 1961-62, and about 18,000 over five years ago, according to the Office of Education.

Approximately 35 percent of the boys with three or more years of "vo-ag" enter farming on a full-time basis. About (Continued on page 3)
