July 22
We started out for Long Beach California where we stayed at a schoolmates place. We toured Disneyland in the evening.

July 23
Toured the Kottsbery farm, Ghost town, and in the afternoon we went swimming at Huntington Beach. The waves were enormous. We saw a ball game in the Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles, California between the Dodgers and Pirates. 8787.7 miles.
