HARRISBURG - A new insect pest, the European chafer beetle, has invaded Pennsylvania, the State Department of Agriculture reported today.

So far, adult beetles have been detected only in a small section of the city of Erie, according to Henry F. Nixon, director of the depa'rtment's Bureau of Plant Industry.








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
