 ness in the Pocono Mountain region.
 About 90 per cent of our population now engages in outdoor recreation, and with more automation, more and more leisure time, more total personal income, greater longevity of people, and a greater proportion of incomes available for discretionary purposes, the demand on the outdoors will increase, Goddard believes. Estimates indicate that the population will double in the next 40 years, but the pressure on outdoor recreation facilities will trip!
 In urging passage of the referendum on a \$70 million bond issue on November 5, Goddard said, "You have to invest money to have growth." The reason Lancaster County has attracted more growth than some of the coal regions is the beauty and livability of the area. Industries and people will move to liveable areas, he said.
 In answer to a question concerning farm land, Goddard said Project 70 funds would not be available to

buy land in 24 rural counties. "The land purchased for outdoor recreation - cites by the Department of Forests and Waters would not be likely to stay in agricultural production at any rate." He gave an example of the Muddy Creek pump storage site which might have made a good park location, but which is now lost forever to this type of development.
 If the referendum passes, \$20 million would be available to local municipalities on a matching basis for development of parks and open spaces. "This money would be available on a first come first served basis," he said. At present only six counties have plans for such parks.

C. Bickley Foster, Lancaster County Planning Director, in introductory remarks, said only two Lancaster County municipalities, out of a total of 61, have any plans for future park development.

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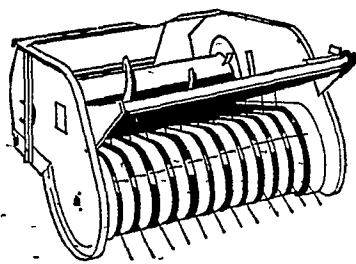
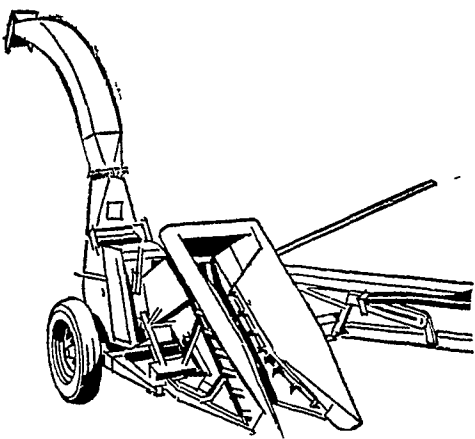
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
