In addition to the champion pen of four, which were mediumweights, Livengood also had the top lightweight pen.

## Lancaster Co. Is Top User Of Fertilizers

HARRISBURG — Pennsylvania farmers used 647,242 tons of fertilizer last year, 3 per cent more than they did in 1961, the State Department of Agriculture reported today.

More than one-fourth of the total was used in four counties — Berks, Chester, Lancaster and York.

Lancaster's total, 66,986 tons, was the highest reported in any county. York was next with 46,004 tons. Pike county was lowest with 14 tons.

In the breeding stock division, Paul Welk, Strasburg R1, showed his aged Yorkshire to the championship of the sow class. He also had the top sow and litter in the show.

William Houser, Lampeter had the reserve champion sow, a mature Chester White. Robert Bitts took Hampshire honors with a junior spring gilt.

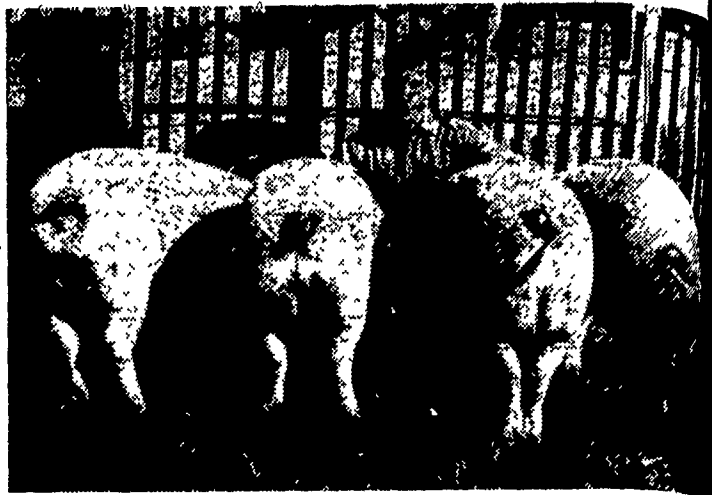

## Martin's Limestone

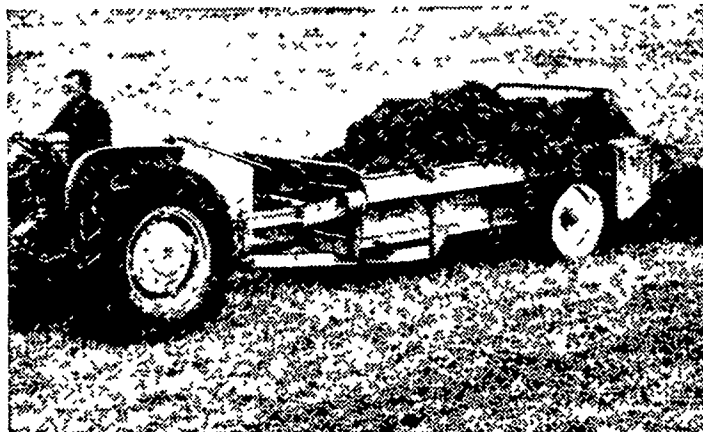
