Types of Floor Wax

Floor wax is available in three general types — paste wax, liquid polishing wax, and liquid self-polishing wax. The manufacturer's label will state what type wax it is — water-base or solvent-base wax.

Paste wax has a solvent base — the solvent acts like a dry-cleaning fluid and cleans as well as waxes. Paste wax needs polishing.

The only difference between paste and liquid polishing wax is the amount of solvent. Liquid polishing wax is easier to apply. Paste wax and liquid polishing wax must not be used on asphalt or some rubber tile. The solvent, which you can tell by its characteristic dry-cleaning odor, causes the asphalt or rubber surface to soften or pit and colors to bleed.

Liquid self-polishing wax is a water-base wax. It's a common choice for kitchen floors where damp wiping is needed often. Don't use a liquid self-polishing wax on wood floors unless the wood is sealed or painted.

A word of caution — once you use either a water-base or a solvent-base wax, don't switch types without first completely removing old wax.

Keep poisons and explosives away from children. It may be safer to destroy the little you may have on hand than to run risk of children or animals getting to them before they are needed next season.

Co. Farm Women Assist T.B. Seal Mail Campaign

Representatives from all the Farm Women Societies in the county are giving an "assist" to the Christmas Seal campaign of the Tuberculosis and Health Society of Lancaster County.

Working in shifts of six members, the women give a half day at the Health Center to help prepare Christmas Seal mail.

The annual campaign opens November 15, when approximately 60,000 letters will be sent out to residents of Lancaster City and County.

Proceeds of the 57th annual Christmas Seal campaign will be used in a program of detection and prevention of TB and other respiratory diseases, through the use of the x-rays and tuberculin test. The Society will always welcome additional volunteers.

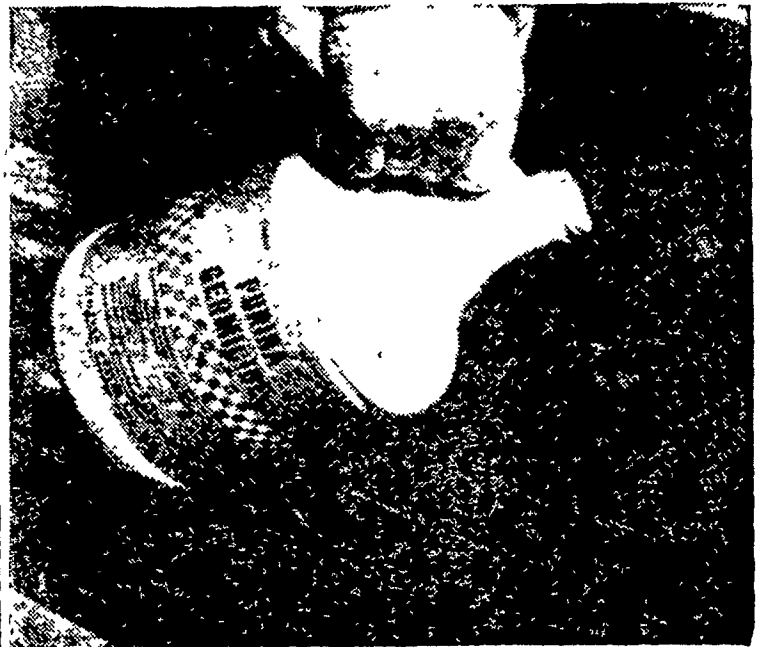
The money will also be used to finance programs of health education and information for school children and adults.

During the past year 358 volunteers gave 1579 hours of service to the TB and Health Society. Volunteers assist in many phases of work in addition to stuffing and preparing campaign mail. Some prepare and deliver campaign materials such as bookmarks and banners to the schools, posters to stores, banks and service stations; place mats to restaurants and payroll enclosures to businesses. Others assist regularly throughout the year with preparation and mailing of x-ray reports, stamping educational literature, preparing kits of materials for nurses, physicians and teachers, assisting on the chest x-ray unit and distributing fliers and educational materials prior to the x-ray survey program. The Society will always welcome additional volunteers.

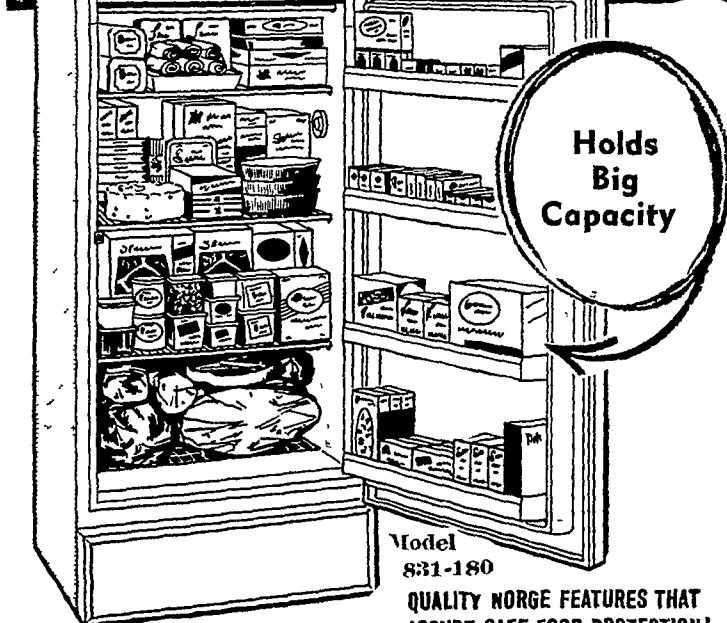
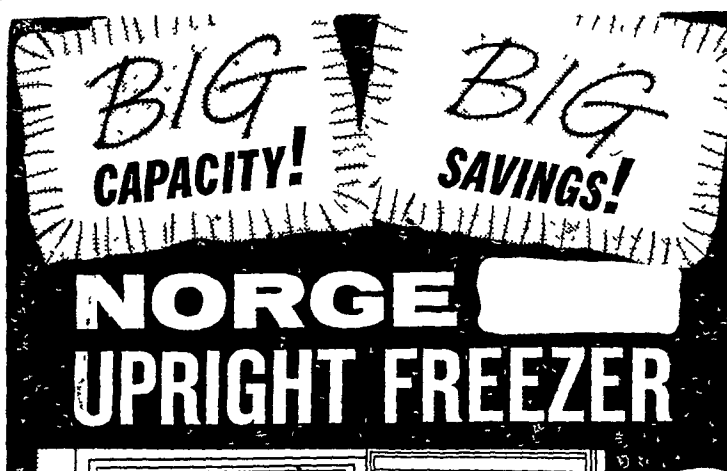
