## Many Exposition Honors Won By County Showmen

Lancaster County exhibitors show title. On Monday, Hosler had topped the field of 128 4-H and FFA entries with his 1,070 pound 4-H project and went on to engage in an exciting seven minute battle with the open class champion for the purple and gold banner.

The biggest wins came in the steer show where Eugene Hosler, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mark Hosler Manheim R3, showed his steer "Champy" to the grand championship of the junior show and went on to garner the reserve championship in the open class competition.

Mae Mast, Elverson R2, placed her Hereford in the runnerup spot of the junior division of the show, but was eliminated in the final round when judge Don L. Good put the grand championship banner on the Hereford entry of Portage Farms, Woodville, Ohio.

The only other grand championship ribbon won by a county exhibitor was in the sheep division where Green Meadows Farms, Leola R1, showed the top animal in the Hampshire bred ewe sale.

The portage farms win on Tuesday cut off Lancaster County's chance of capturing its third Champion-steer-of-the-

Judge Good, a Kansas State University professor, said the Hosler Angus had better covering than the champion, but he lacked thickness in the lower quarters. The steer was bred by Neidig Brothers, State College.

In the junior show, a second member of the Mast family, Wesley, showed the reserve champion Hereford. The yearling ewe entered by Green Meadows was shown by Edward Hess. She was sired by the farm's 1957 grand champion at the International Livestock Show in Chicago.
