## Countians Sweep Junior Division Of Steer Show

In an imposing show of strength, Lancaster County 4-H showmen carried away most of the breed championship banners at the Eastern National Livestock Exposition Monday at Timonium, Md.

A 1,095 pound summer yearling Angus shown by John Frey, Quarryville R2, was named the champion Angus and Grand Champion of the junior division of the show. Reserve championship honors went to the 985 pound Hereford of Wesley Mast, Elverson R2.

A stocky Angus, champion of the open classes, shown by Shirley and Doris Brown, Tigerville, S C, nosed out the junior champion for Grand Champion steer of the show honors.

Reserve show honors went to the Hereford shown by Still House Hollow Farm, Hume, Virginia.

In the Junior show on Monday, all six of the finalists in the Angus judging were Lancaster County steers. In Hereford competition only one steer from out of the county spoiled the local youngsters' record. Following Wesley Mast's middleweight into the championship circle was the heavyweight entry of Miss Kathy Goen, Prince Georges County, Md.

In the Angus classes John Frey took the blue ribbon in the light weight classes followed by Wesley Mast. Wesley showed the first place steer in middleweight class and took him on to the reserve Angus.

All four runners-up in the regional contest were also from the county. Presented certificates for their achievements by James Fink, Vocational agriculture supervisor and advisor of the state Young Farmers, were Isaac Geib, Manheim R3; Clifford

W. Holloway, Peach Bottom; Elyin M. Rohrer, Jr., 2529 Horeshoe Road, Lancaster, and Clyde Aument, Holtwood R1.

Fisher, manager of Stauffer Homestead Farms, is a charter member and vice president of the Garden Spot Chapter Young Farmers, New Holland. He is a leader in the New Holland Community 4-H club, a director of the Lancaster County Swine Producers Association, and a steward in Ranck's Evangelical and United Brethren Church.

A native of Jeffersonville, Ohio, Fisher came to York County after high school graduation. He became swine

## Co-op Agency Kills Resolution To Reconsider Milk Order Vote

Over 500 member-dairyfarmers at the annual meeting of the Metropolitan Cooperative Milk Producers Bargaining Agency Thursday killed a resolution to have a ballot vote on the New York milk marketing order returned to local cooperatives for reconsideration.

The resolution to reconsider came on the heels of a speech by Congressman Samuel S. Stratton of the 35th congressional district of New York.

Stratton told the dairyfarmers meeting in Syracuse, N. Y., "There is no doubt that a resounding 'No' vote on the November 25th New York milk market order referendum

would be the quickest and most effective way of cleaning up those outmoded and undemocratic features of the milk order referendum procedure."
