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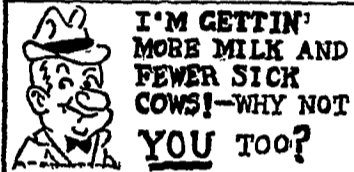

Those planning to attend the meeting are urged to make reservations at the County Agent's Office by Jan. 6th — Phone No. — 394 - 6851.

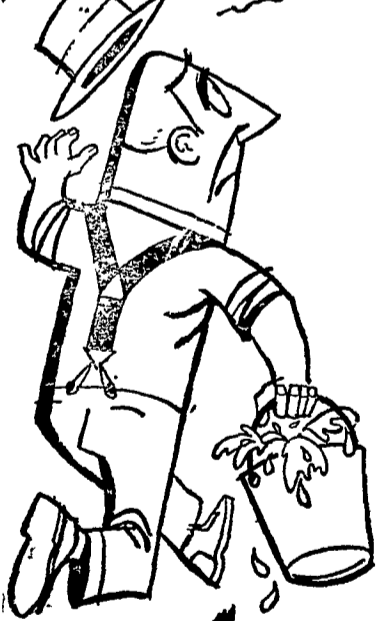

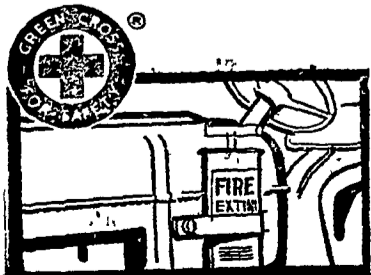

ies adjoin, it was believed that there would be advantages in such joint operation," Davis said.

The Eastern States president said that comprehensive studies completed recently indicate that there are "significant economic advantages to be gained for members of both organizations from total consolidation of resources."

Eastern States and GLF are two of the oldest farmer co-operatives in the nation. Both have memberships of more than 100,000. Eastern States was founded in 1918 by a group of New England rural and urban leaders. GLF was formed in 1920 by the New York State Grange, the New York Farm Bureau Federation, and the Dairymen's League Cooperative Association.

Eastern States has its headquarters in West Springfield, Mass., GLF in Ithaca, N. Y.

Eastern States volume for the calendar year ending December 31 is expected to exceed \$100 million. For the fiscal year ended last June 30, GLF had sales volume of \$206 million in its wholesale and marketing operations.

Poinsettias

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scape artists in Florida use poinsettias in ornamental plantings. It would not be unusual for plants to live as long as 20 or 30 years in this desirable environment.

When mother receives her Christmas poinsettia, Lynn Smith advises, she can keep it for years of pleasure if she follows some simple precautions:

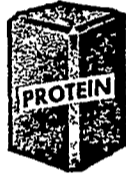
(1) Keep the potted plant out of either hot or cold drafts. Place it near a window where it receives good sunlight. Plants remain healthy only in a temperature range of 60 to 75 degrees.

(2) Although flowering will stop in the middle of February, the plant should remain in the sunny window until May. Cut the plant back to 5 or 6 inches in height and put it outside, pot and all, in light shade after Memorial Day.

(3) In mid-August bring the plant inside and put it in the sunny window again.

(4) In early October, begin placing a box over the plant to cut out daylight at 5 o'clock each evening. Blooming will begin in time for Christmas.

Lynn Smith warns not to overwater the plant. "Water your poinsettia only when the top of the soil feels dry to the touch," she says. "Place the pot on a dish large enough to catch the runoff from the bottom of the pot."
