Hunting Season To Re-open

For the sixth consecutive year, Pennsylvania small game hunters will get a chance to test their mid-winter shooting

skills. The 1963 extended small game season on cottontail rabbits, squirrels and tufted grouse opens Monday, December 23 and closes Saturday, January 4. Daily shooting hours are 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. except for Christmas day, December 25 and Sunday, December 29 when no hunting is allowed.

The Pennsylvania Game Commission reminded hunters today that daily bag limits have been set at four rabbits, six squirrels and two grouse. Hunters were also reminded that they cannot exceed season bag limits of 20 rabbits, 30 squirrels and 10 grouse and must include any of these species killed during the regular small game season during November.
