

Poultry Auction Will Continue Despite Loss Of Two Consignors

Two of the major consign- year. ers of broilers at the Lancaster Poultry Center announced this week that they will not use the facilities of the weekly auction after January 20.

Poultry Exchange Directors at a meeting Thursday night decided to continue the auction on a regular basis after the feed firms of Miller and Bushong of Rohrerstown and D E Horn and Company of York notified the association of their decision to market bioilers directly to a processing plant

A spokesman for the Poultry Exchange said the weekly auction will continue to operate and has been given assurances by buyers that they will support the sales No changes in listing or sales dates are anticipated

A reliable source estimated feed firms has made up 75 signments during the past

The exchange official said the board feels there is still a need for the auction and that it can render a real service to the small, independent growers and buyers.
