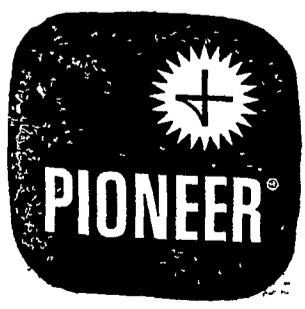

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**1964 Feed Grain Program Is Explained**

Enrollment in the 1964 Feed Grain Program will open February 10th, and end March 27th according to Miss Dorothy Neel, Office Manager of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee

Notices of individual farm base and payment rates will be mailed to all farmers in the county on January 24th she said

Farmers participating in the program, can earn both diversion and price support payments and be eligible for price support loans. Participation will help stabilize feed grain prices, maintain farm income and reduce grain carryover stocks

Minimum diversion is 20% of the feed grain base and maximum diversion is the larger of 50% of the base or 25 acres but not in excess of the base

The low diversion payment rate applies to the first 20% of the base diverted. The high diversion rate applies to the acreage diverted in excess of 20%, and to the entire acreage diverted if the total diverted is at least 40% of the base

Details of the program and how it can be applied to individual farms, are available in the county office. Several informational meetings will be held in the county next month. Dates and places will be announced later.

County Handbooks for the 1964 Agricultural Conservation Program are available in the office

Farmers are urged to take soil tests as soon as possible and enroll early in the year. This year a complete soil test made by the Pennsylvania State University is required for improvement of pasture and permanent grass fields by lime and/or fertilizer, as well as for new seedings.

Applications for planting of forest trees must be made by January 31st, Miss Neel said.
