Directors said that in the face of this development they "couldn't justify continuing the exchange auction." The final auction is scheduled for January 30.

In a statement Wednesday night, the association board said the exchange "had served the poultry industry well during its nine-year period of operation.

"We believe the auction has made a real contribution to the local poultry industry and we deeply regret the lack of support made our action necessary."
