

Manor YFA Has Classes On Hog Production

Manor Young Farmers has scheduled a series of three meetings on swine production February 18 and 25 and March 3

Topic of the first meeting in the Penn Manor High School will be "Promise Them Anything". The second meeting will be held on the farm of Harold Herr, Millersville R1, where littermates that were separated into two groups will be evaluated as to feed conversion, backfat and time on feed to reach market weight. One group was on full feed

and the other on limited feeding. Farm management practices will be discussed.

At the third meeting, in Ralph Frey's butcher shop in Highville, the same hogs will be evaluated on the rail Pork production from the packer-housewife angle will be emphasized.

Dairymen from the surrounding area met Thursday February 6, in the Conference room of the Elizabethtown Trust Co. for a record workshop.

The workshop, sponsored by the Pennsylvania State University was under the direction of Victor W Plastow, Associate County Agent of Lancaster County

Each Dairymen, using his own herd book, made up a set of charts which enabled him to compare his herd with county and state averages pinpoint his poor producers, plot milk production month by month and check the value of product over feed costs These figures enable the dairymen to improve the efficiency of his operation

The meeting was attended by 10 dairymen who are members of Circuit #7 of the Red Rose DHIA

Plastow was assisted by Wilbur Houser, head tester of Lancaster County and Clarence W Under the DHIA supervisor of Red Rose #7.

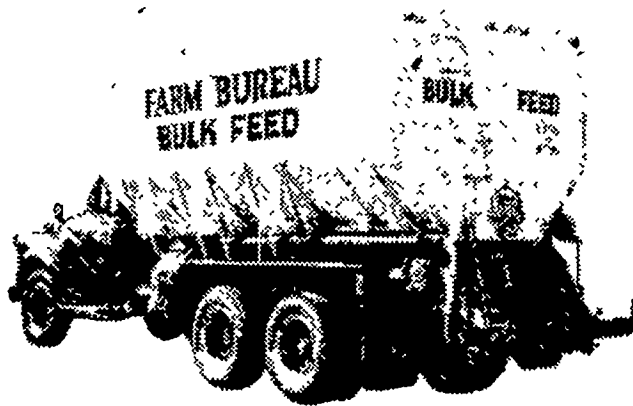

(Continued from Page 1) ges in our society and called for more emphasis on the study of the humanities along with the big push for more science and mathematics

"Students must learn the meaning of liberty, and appreciate the influence of poverty, hunger and greed", if we are to progress in this "second industrial revolution"

"Our technological advancement is outrunning our ability to deal with it" he said "For example, we can produce great quantities of food and preserve it with irradiation, but we still can't get it to the hungry"

County Agent M M Smith reported that approximately 40 per cent of the extension workers' time last year was spent in working with rural youth

He said the service is making greater use of mass media to reach greater numbers of people One of the most pressing problems is getting farmers and custom spray operators to use chemicals properly "We don't believe farmers can get along without chemicals," he said

Mrs Doris Thomas, associate Home Economist, reported that 900 girls participated in 39 Home Ec clubs during the year.

Treasurer C Warren Leininger reported expenditures of \$17,538.66 during the year and a balance of \$118.71 at the end of the year
