Also to be cited at the luncheon will be the second

place national winner, James Snyder, a high school student from Freeport, Ill. Twenty honorable mention awards will go to students from Wyoming to Vermont, according to A. O. Smith.

Wissler is a vocational agricultural student and is secretary of the Future Farmers of America, Grasslands Chapter. He has been a member of the parliamentary procedure team and has won two FFA Foundation awards in crop raising and safety.

Masonic Homes Farm, Eliz-abethtown consigned the high selling boar, a Duroc. He went out at \$62.50 to Stephen A. Martin, Drumore R1. Boars av-eraged \$47.77.

The 43-head sale, held at Paul Z. Martin Sales Stable, grossed members \$3,097.50.

## Holstein Men To Hear Three Dairy Experts

The speakers will be Dr. Clun-ton E. Meadows, East Lansing, Mich.; Ralph Evans, Beverly, Mass.; and J. Brian McCague, Alliston, Ont., Can-ada.

The Elizabethtown session will be one of seven regional meetings arranged for the fourth annual Breeder Insti-tute of the PHA.

Dr. Meadows will speak on "Dairy Cattle Breeding, To-day and Tomorrow," while Ev-ans will address the session on "Steps to Profitable Dairy Farming."

McCague, farm manager for the internationally famous Glenafton Farm, will be repre-senting one of the leading dairy cattle breeding enterpri-ses on the continent. Topic of

his talk will be "Herd Man-agement and Promotion."

A question and answer pe-riod will follow the formal talks. Admission tickets are available from local Holstein Club of-ficials, and all members of the 4-H Clubs and the Future Farmers of America organiza-tions will be admitted free of charge.

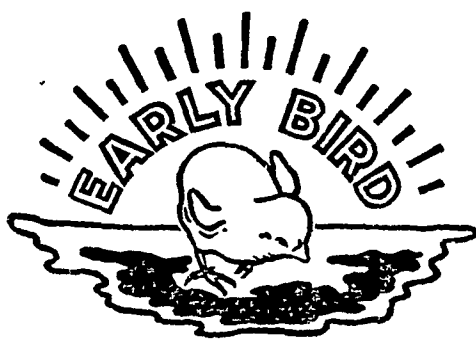

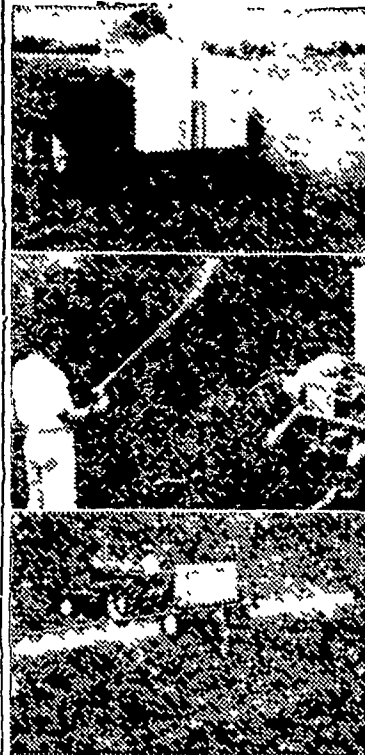
