

Price Support Available To Feed Grain Participants

Growers who participate in the 1964 feed grain program will thereby qualify for price support on their 1964 crops of corn, grain sorghum and barley. Feed Seldomridge, chairman Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Council Committee has announced Signup for the program will continue at the ASCS County Office through March 27.

As last year, support for the three crops will be made available partly through loans and purchase agreements and partly through price-support payments. While rates of the loans vary by counties rates of the price-support payments are the same throughout the county.

Loans and purchase agreements for the 1964 crops will reflect national average prices of \$1.10 per bushel for corn, \$4 cents per bushel for barley and \$1.77 per hundred-weight for grain sorghum. Participating farmers will be able to put all of their 1964 crop of corn, grain sorghum, and barley under price-support loans and purchase agreements.

Rates of the price-support payments have been set at 12 cents per bushel for barley and 23 cents per hundred-weight for grain sorghum. The price-support payments will be made on the normal production of the acreage planted to the three feed grains in 1964, the payment is assured no matter what disposition is made of the crop.

In general, Seldomridge explained, feed grain producers will participate in the program by reducing their acreages of one or more of the three crops by at least 20 percent of the farm's base acreage and devoting such acreage to an approved conserving use. By such participation, farmers earn a diversion payment as well as qualify for the loans, purchase agreements and price-support payments. Diversion payments under the 1964 program will average higher than last year and the maximum diversion is higher.

Oats and rye are not included in the 1964 feed grain program, therefore eligibility for price support on these two crops is not dependent on participation in the program.

Milk Production Shows Gains

On a daily basis the February milk production per cow in Pennsylvania was 22.76 pounds compared with 22.58 pounds in January and 22.50 pounds for February 1963, according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service.

Daily production reached the 20 pound level in 1960 and in 1961 was slightly more than 21 pounds. In 1963 and 1964 it was in the 22½ - 22¾ pound range.

Seasonally the daily milk production per cow increases from the first of the year until it reaches a peak in May.

New Package Developed For Frozen Eggs

HARRISBURG — A new 10-pound package, designed to broaden the use of Pennsylvania certified frozen eggs, has been introduced as part of the Commonwealth's expanding egg marketing program.

State Agriculture Secretary Leland H. Bull said the package was "designed for the convenience of smaller institutions that, in the past, had to go outside Pennsylvania to purchase frozen eggs in this quantity."

The first 10-pound package of Pennsylvania certified frozen eggs — packed at the Co-operative GLF Exchange plant in Bloomsburg — was presented to Lieutenant Governor Raymond P. Shafer by Dave Landers, plant manager. Later it was given to the Polyclinic Hospital Harrisburg, and accepted by Miss Helen Druley, director of food services at the institution.

The GLF plant was the first to begin operating under the Pennsylvania certified frozen egg plan. Several others have
