New Holland Auction

The 88 dairy cows at the May 27 auction sold very slow but at nearly steady prices. Five bulls and 23 heifers also sold.
 Fresh Holstein cows ranged \$250-565; Guernseys \$150-225, and other breeds \$150-250. Stock bulls were \$140-170 and stock heifers \$65-175.
 The 290 head at the May 25 horse sale sold slow and steady. Riding horses were \$125-275, driving horses \$125-300, and killer horses 7-7½ cents a pound. Pony mares were \$40-110 and geldings \$30-125.
 Hogs gained 75 to 100 at the May 25 auction as 325 market hogs and 15 shoats sold.
 Retail hogs to local butchers brought 17 50-18 35, and grades 1 to 3 went to the packers at 17-17 75. Heavyweight hogs sold at 15 75-16 85. Shoats brought \$9 00 to \$16 00 per head.
 The 90 calves at the May 25 auction met a 2 00 to 3 00 lower market. Choice vealers were \$160-170.
 At the May 23 auction, market hogs weighing 170-180 pounds brought 16-17 10, 180-200 pounds 16 50-17 10, 200-220 pounds 16 75-17 35, 220-240 pounds 16 50-17 10, 240 pounds up 15 75-16 50. Sows were 10 50-13 50. One lot of feeder pigs brought 32.

BAI Director Is Appointed

HARRISBURG — Secretary Leland H. Bull has announced the appointment of Dr. J. C. Shook as director of the Bureau of Animal Industry, the State Department of Agriculture.
 Dr. Shook, of Spring Mill RD 2, Centre county, has been on the department veterinary staff since 1957 and for the past two years has been acting BAI director.
 He received the bachelor's science degree from the Pennsylvania State University in animal science and preventive medicine in 1942, completing the four-year course in three years.
 After three years of service with the US Army in Europe during World War II he trained in veterinary medicine at the University of Pennsylvania, graduating in 1948.

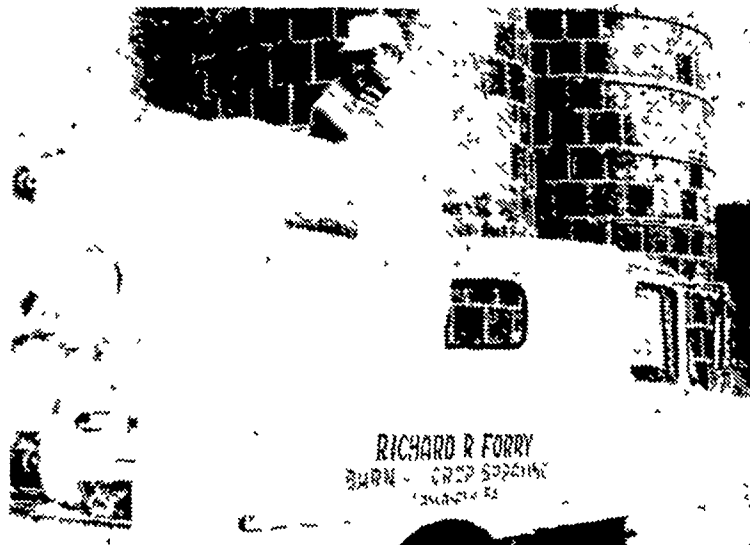
