He said the wholesale and retail demand for the season's first picking is "excellent." Competition from adjacent states in good quality fruit has so far been short, Young said.

The Washington Boro crop, grown on the protected sandy hills along the Susquehanna River, is normally the first picked north of Maryland and commands an exceptionally high priced early market.

Young said prices on the cooperative sales floor Wednesday were \$21 a bushel for No. 1 grade, \$15 for No. 1 cracks and \$12 for No. 2 grade fruit
