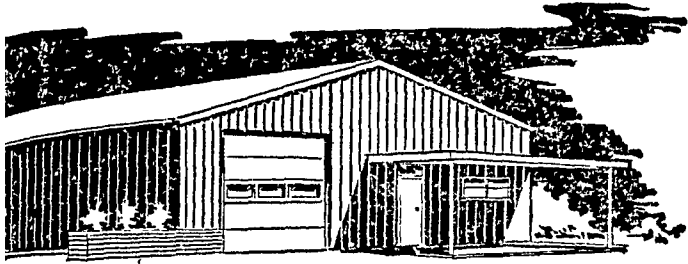

Vice president Carol Eby chaired the meeting in the ab-

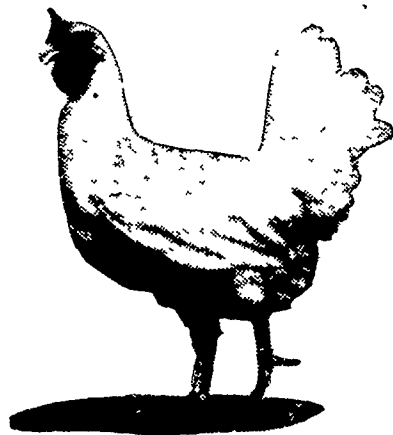
