"The key to stop disease is to get the birds to the laboratory immediately upon noticing a sick bird," he stated.

Too many poultrymen try "shoving" antibiotics first hoping to cure them. Then after the patent medicine doesn't work the sick birds are brought in to be diagnosed. To give a proper recommendation it is important to have the birds

before they have received antibiotics.

Under management he stressed cleaning and disinfecting the house inside and out after each flock has gone. Also keep other people who may carry disease to your chickens from entering your flock. Have only one age of birds on the farm at one time and know the source of the chicks from the day they are born. If the man who raises the chicks doesn't do a good job you can't expect to have a high producing flock.

The meeting at the Poultry Center also featured A. F. Kish, Feed Consultant and, Richard C. Hann, Manager of Feed Sales and Service from the local Farm Bureau Association.
