

NATIONAL 4-H CLUB WEEK

The week of September 26 to October 3 will be celebrated as National 4-H Club Week by the 94,700 Clubs throughout the U.S. and Puerto Rico. 43,000 of these Clubs are in Pennsylvania, and these head, heart, hands and health youth are among the 2 1/4 million members of 4-H.

In Lancaster County, the week will be celebrated by radio interviews, poster dis-

plays and floats in local fairs. Each of the cooperating radio stations will feature 4-H members holding 10-15 minute interviews with other 4-H members, and with youth leaders. The following members will be the interviewers:

Apple Program Is Unopposed

Deputy Secretary of Agriculture Jack R. Grey conducted the hearing at which no opposition was voiced by growers present. Proposed rules and regulations now go to Secretary of Agriculture Leland H. Bull and will become effective 90 days after he signs them.

The program provides for rigid standards of quality for apples that will be identified by a special seal for consumer recognition, Secretary Bull pointed out.

"This program is a proposal of our recently organized State Apple Marketing Advisory Council," Secretary Bull said. "It will assure consumer and commercial buyers of consistently high quality in Pennsylvania grown apples, and will be an important step toward a stronger market for our growers."

Double National Corn Picking Championship for Allis-Chalmers

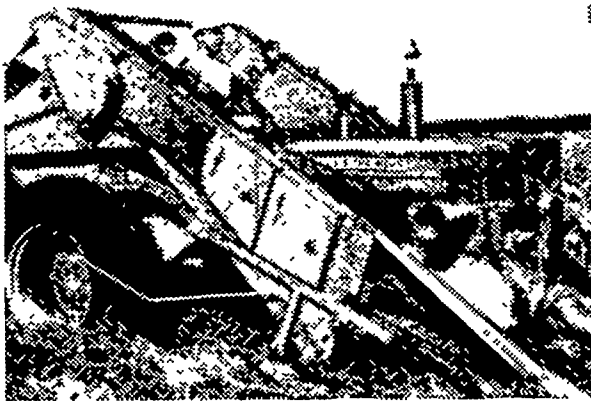
[This is the first double national championship ever won in the same year with one manufacturer's corn picker and combine.]

2-ROW CORN PICKER, MODEL 170

Arlyn Zee, Albany, Wisconsin, farmer piloted his Allis-Chalmers 170 corn picker to national fame this year, setting a new world's record. He won over the nation's six top 1963 state champions and unseated last year's national champion under some of the driest, brittle picking conditions seen in a national meet.

His picker's new dual rotary feeders and corn-saving capacity really paid off.

Zee's expert ability topped all others with 97.701 out of 100, two-hundredths of a point better than his winning run in the Wisconsin state contest.

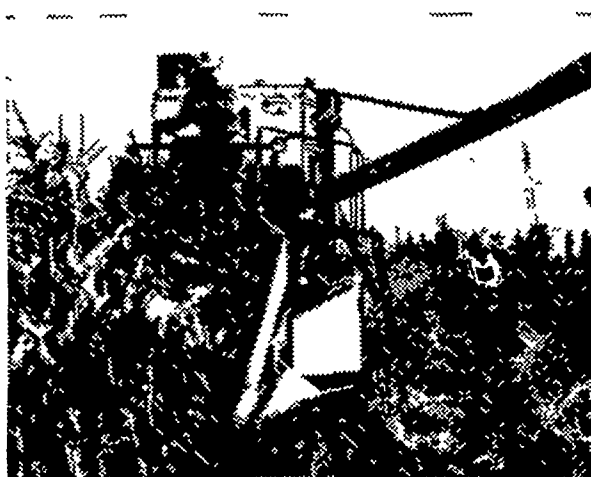


2-ROW COMBINE, GLEANER, MODEL A . . . AGAIN

Lawrence Fisher, Palmyra, Michigan, set two new records in the National Corn Picking Contest. He is the only combine champion ever to retain the title two years running.

And he broke his own world corn combine efficiency record set last year with the same great GLEANER "A." His new record is 98.034.

The GLEANER is really a farmer's kind of combine, with its down-front cylinder and controlled threshing action. The machine is simple to adjust and easy to operate.



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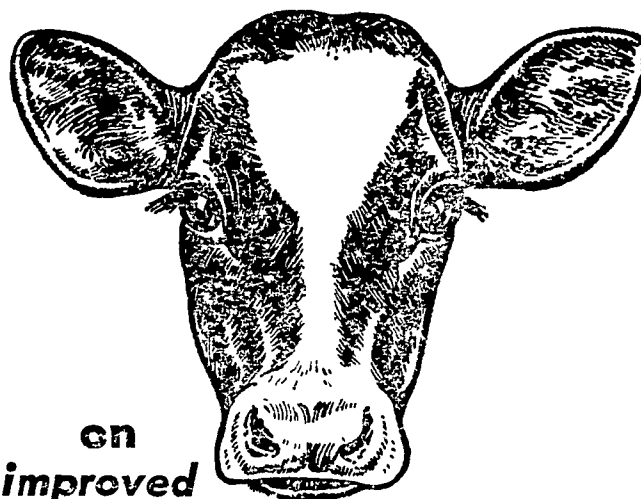
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
