SHORT COURSES ANNOUNCED BY PENN STATE

Short courses for the month of October were announced this week by the College of Agriculture at The Pennsylvania State University.

Supervisor training for Dairy Herd Improvement Associations (D.H.I.A.) will be held October 5 to 16, reported Fred C. Snyder, director of agricultural short courses. Interested persons should see their county agricultural agent regarding an arithmetic test, the duties of a supervisor, a letter of recommendation, and an information form to be filled out.

The annual short course in greenhouse flower production will be held October 6 to 8, Dr. Snyder said. A maximum of 40 persons will be enrolled to provide small groups for laboratory instruction. The course is designed for employees or prospective employees such as foremen or growers.

Dairy cows sold steady at the Sept 23 sale. There were 185 cows, 4 bulls and 11 heifers offered.

Fresh Holsteins sold for 235 to 460, Guenseys, 135 to 235, other breeds, 225 to 300.

Bulls brought 100 to 245, and heifers, 90 to 245.

There were 318 horses offered at the Sept 21 sale and they sold at a steady rate with killers lower.

Riding horses brought 125 to 325; driving horses, 125 to 265; killers, 6½ to 7 cents per pound.

Pony mares sold for 50 to 125, and geldings 25 to 80.

At the Sept 21 hog sale 303 hogs and 25 shoats sold at a steady trend.

Hogs retailed for 18.50 to 19. Wholesale US 13, brought 18 to 18.50, heavyweights, 17 to 17.75. Shoats sold at 7½ to 12.

At the calf sale on Sept 21, 130 head sold steadily. Choice and prime, 34 to 36, standard, 28½ to 29, good and low choice, 29 to 34, common, 15 to 25.
