1 prepared for baking
2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
Salt and pepper.
Sauté onion in butter or margarine until tender. Combine with cracker crumbs, lemon rind, lemon juice, paprika and sour cream. Pack into cavity of fish, place in greased baking dish. Brush with melted butter or margarine and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Bake, covered in moderate oven (350 degrees) 45 minutes or until fish flakes easily when touched with a fork. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

SEAFOOD THERMIDOR

1 can (4 ounces) sliced mushrooms, drained
1 tablespoon butter or margarine

1 cup diced cooked lobster (or 6½ ounce can, drained)
1 can (10 ounces) frozen condensed cream of shrimp soup
¼ cup milk
¼ teaspoon dry mustard
Dash cayenne pepper
Grated Parmesan cheese
Paprika
Brown mushrooms in butter in pan. Add lobster and cook a few minutes. Stir in soup, milk, mustard, and cayenne. Heat slowly; stir often until soup is thawed. Spoon lobster mixture into 3 individual baking dishes. Sprinkle cheese and paprika on top. Bake in a hot oven (400 degrees) about 15 minutes. Makes 3 servings.

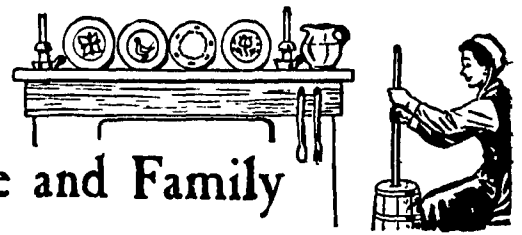
During the business session a report was read from the Cancer Society acknowledging receipt of 479 dressings and three bed jackets during the year.

Some Things A Household Inventory Can Do For You

An inventory will reveal the approximate value of all your household possessions. It might spotlight the need for more insurance against fire, theft, or any of the other hazards that can befall a household. The more detailed and accurate the inventory, the better adjustment you'll get should disaster strike.

An inventory reveals good buys and poor ones, helps in planning future expenditures, and helps you in thinking about and making better plans before buying.

Most inventory forms have a column for the approximate date you bought each item, its cost including installation, and its present value. The guide for setting present value is to base the value on the cost of replacement today, divided by the number of years you've used the item.

After you've made your inventory, keep it in a safe deposit box, and review it at least once a year to bring it up to date.

Worth Knowing

Bacon squares are pork cut from the jowl and cured and smoked. Bacon squares may be sliced and fried or broiled until crisp. Or they may be simmered or baked with beans or other vegetables as seasoning.

The enrichment of flour

and cereal adds about one-third more thiamine, one-fifth more iron and niacin, and one-tenth more riboflavin to the Nation's diet than would be available if these foods were not enriched.

Vanilla is still the favorite flavor in ice cream in the United States. Vanilla ice cream sales exceed all other flavors combined. Chocolate is second and strawberry third.

Have You Thought of These Ways to Use the Timer?

Set the built-in timer on your range or a separate movable one to remind you to do various jobs, such as take the roast out of the freezer to thaw, make a phone call at a specific time, or when to leave for shopping.

The timer is handy for regulating children's activities, such as how long to watch television, when to put their toys away, when to leave for the school bus, and many other activities during the day.

Use the timer for short-time cooking on top of the range, and to remind you to turn the meat during broiling.

Some Tips on Potato Storage

Potatoes need more careful storage than you think. Potatoes keep best in a dark, dry, well-ventilated place with a temperature about 45 to 50 degrees.

In a warm place, potatoes shrivel and sprout, in a cold

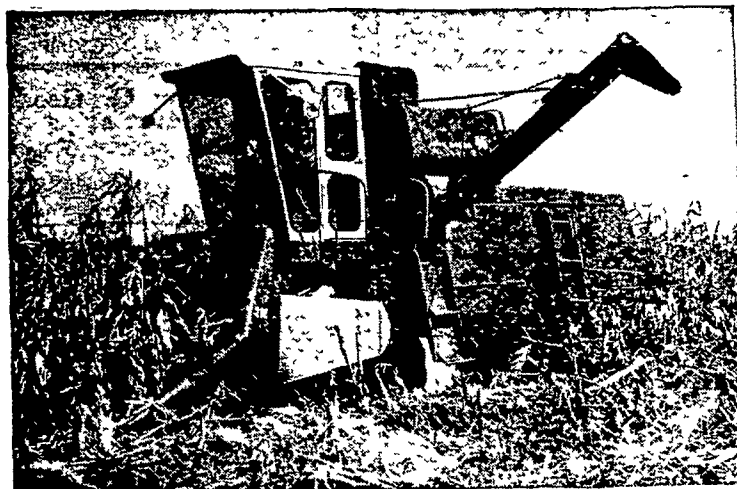
