> Potatoes were bringing the best September price since 1952, averaging \$3 00 a hundredweight It was, howevei, \$115 less per cwt than the mid-August price

> Offsetting these declines were stronger prices for livestock and livestock products Hogs were up 60 cents per cwt, from mid-August Beef animals advanced 30 cents and calves 10 cents per cwt. during the month
