



Cornerstone Laid For New Allied Mills Bulk Plant

A new Distribution Center for Allied Mills, Inc. is now under construction at the Lancaster-Hempfield Industrial Park. The cornerstone was laid yesterday at a ceremony that featured top personnel from Allied Mills, Inc., and key local dignitaries. L. F. Photo.

At a ceremony held yesterday morning at the Lancaster-Hempfield Industrial Park, the cornerstone was laid for the first unit in the new industrial park.

The building now being constructed is due to be completed early in 1965. It is the first of two units to be built by Allied Mills, Inc., Chicago, Ill. It will serve as a distribution center for their bulk and packaged feeds, and will provide office space for clerical and administrative personnel.

Construction of the second unit is scheduled to begin next year. It will be a manufacturing plant where raw ingredients will be processed into "Wayne Feeds."

Executives from the main office of Allied Mills, Inc., included Thomas Graham, General Sales Manager, and John Richardson, Director of Public Relations. They outlined their company's plans for the new structures and exchanged words of welcome with local officials.

George W. Davis, Jr., President of the Lancaster Chamber of Commerce, welcomed the Allied Mills Company to Lancaster.

Other local dignitaries that were on hand for the occasion were G. T. Storb, Vice-president Lancaster County Industrial Bureau, Benjamin Weaver, Chairman of County Commissioners; Benjamin F. Gleider, Hempfield Township Supervisor, Ohmer F. Ging-

rich, West Hampfield Township Supervisor; George B. Coe, Mayor of Lancaster. G. T. Storb introduced Clifford L. Jones, Deputy Secretary of Commerce for Pennsylvania. Jones delivered the principal remarks.

At the sale on October 7, 154 cows, 3 bulls and 8 heifers were sold.

Fresh Holsteins brought 235-480; Other breeds, 225-335.

Bulls sold for 115-170, and heifers, 125-240.

At the Horse sale on October 5, 281 head were sold. Riding horses brought 125-200; driving horses, 125-285, and killers, 6½ to 7 cents per pound. Pony mares brought 30-60, and geldings, 20-50.

At the Hog sale 353 head were sold and the trend was 50 to 75 lower. Retail hogs

brought 18-19; wholesale (U. S. 1-3) sold for 17-18; heavy-weights, 16.50-17. Sows brought 12-15, and the 50 shoats sold for 7-13.

The 109 calves received sold at a steady trend at the sale on October 5. Choice and prime brought 34-37; good and low choice, 24-32; standard, 20-24; common, 16-20.

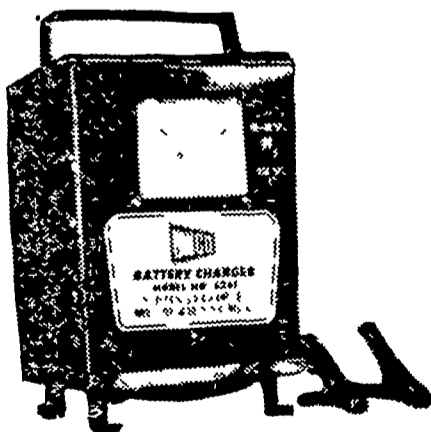
