### Livestock - ---Roundup

#### Cattle

Although there were 2 per cent less cattle on feed in the U.S., cattle feeders in Pennsylvania had 51,000 cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market on October 1, 1964, according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service. This was 1,000 head, or 2 per cent, more than were on feed on October 1, 1963. Marketings of fed cattle during the July-September quarter were 34,000, the same as a year earlier. There were 42,000 cattle placed on feed during the quarter compared with 35,000 the previous year Cattle on feed less than 3 months on October 1 totaled 35,000 head up 4,000 trom a year earlier. The number of cattle on feed 3-6 months at 6,000 was down 3,-000 from a year earlier, and more than 6 months was unchanged at 10,000 head. Numbers of cattle in the under 500 pounds, 500-699 pounds and 700-899 pounds classes increased 1,000 head each to 4,-000, 9,000 and 20,000 respectively while the 900-1099 pounds class at 15,000 was unchanged.
