Twenty thousand questionnaires have been sent to farmers in all 67 counties seeking information on harvested acreage and production of the principal crops.

"Because of crop failures and reduced yields resulting from the drought, it is important that these questionnaires be filled out accurately and returned promptly," Dewey O. Boster, agricultural statistician in charge, said. "Significant changes have taken place since the preliminary June acreage survey was made and it is necessary that we have complete reports from which to prepare final 1964 production estimates."

**Pa. Corn Yield Reduced By Six Million Bushels**

The 1964 drought may cost Keystone State farmers as much as six million bushels of corn, according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service.

Latest estimates, based on October 1 conditions, indicate total production of 51.7 million bushels can be expected in Pennsylvania. This is two million bushels less than a month earlier — and 5.7 million bushels below the August 1 forecast that was made before dry weather began taking its toll of crops.

Yield per acre is expected to be 56 bushels, according to the October 1 forecast. A month earlier the estimate was 58 bushels, while on August 1 conditions indicated a possible yield of 62 bushels.

Total production in two previous years — both extremely dry — was 43.0 million bushels in 1963, and 44.1 million bushels in 1962.

The 1964 hay crop also will million tons indicated. This be below average, according to compares to 3,217 million tons the Crop Reporting Service, last year, and 2,518 million with total production of 3,248 tons in 1962.

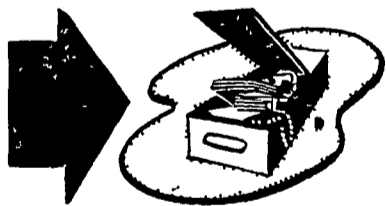

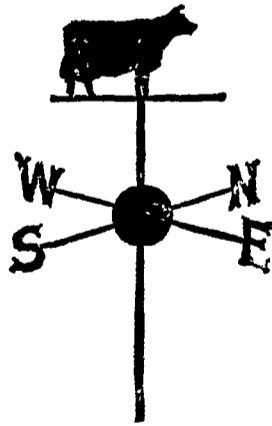
