bels for care instructions, fiber
content, and special fabric
finishes. Examine the style and
workmanship for ease in up-
keep.

Remember, original cost plus
cost of upkeep equals total
cost of a garment.

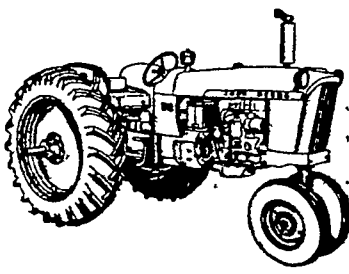
Single Row Crop
