## Egg Marketing Council Formed

The group will recommend a broad marketing and promotion plan to Secretary Bull. High on the list of objectives is the development of new egg products, intensified consumer education, and strict quality control regulations at every step from producer to retailer.

Pennsylvania last year was the nation's third most important egg producing state. Total production of 3.1 billion eggs was valued at \$101 million.
