Wivell Wins Mount Joy Capon Club Roundup

At the Mount Joy Capon Club Roundup held last Tuesday at Hostetter's Banquet Hall, by the Elizabethtown-Donegal 4-H Club the grand championship was won by Joe Wivell, Columbia RD 1.

Wivell, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Wivell, was also high scorer in the record book competition.

Winner of the reserve grand championship was Kathleen Ney, Marietta R1.

The birds were judged by Prof. Carl Dossin, Poultry Specialist from Penn State University. Each of the thirteen contestants entered two birds in the roundup, and each brought one extra to be sold after the supply of contest birds had been sold.

The competing oven-ready beauties sold for a straight 65 cents per pound and the extras brought 60 cents. The Mount Joy Rotary Club members, sponsors of the roundup, hosted the 4-H'ers for lunch and later purchased all of the capons.

Red Rose DHIA Reports Top Cows And Herds

The Red Rose Dairy Herd Improvement Association of Lancaster County reported in their recent monthly newsletter that the following records for milk and fat had been made in newly completed lactations:

A Registered Holstein cow owned by Christ K. Lapp & Son, Gap, R2, completed the highest 305 day lactation. Beryl produced 21,232 lbs. of milk, 890 lbs. of butterfat with a 4.2% test. Second high lactation was completed by a Holstein cow owned by Joseph L. Fisher, Ronks, R1. Prilly produced 21,151 lbs. of milk, 871 lbs. of butterfat with a 4.1% test in 305 days.

The herd of I. Eby Hostetter, Gap, R1, had the highest monthly butterfat average. This herd of 20.0 Registered & Grade Holstein cows averaged 1,680 lbs. of milk, 65 lbs. of butterfat with a 3.9% test. The herd of Kenneth A. Skiles, Narvon R2, placed second. This herd of 25.4 Registered & Grade Holstein cows averaged 1,544 lbs. of milk, 62 lbs. of butterfat with a 4.0% test.

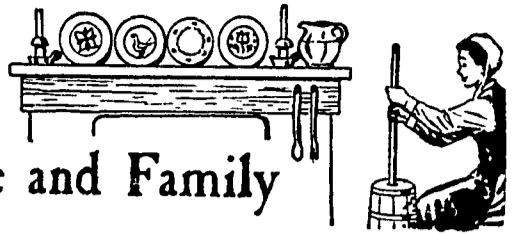

Some Signs Of Good Workmanship In Ready-To-Wear Clothing

Garment cut on correct grain . . . it will wear and hang better than a garment cut off-grain.

Accurate matching of patterned material — adds to attractiveness of garment

Deep seams — allow for adjustment, resist pulling out, and lie smoother. Seam stitching should be straight with 12 to 15 stitches to an inch, thread tension balanced, and seams finished to prevent raveling.

A hem at least two inches wide with stitches invisible from the right side. Close even stitching if buttonholes are machine made.

Good quality buttons or fasteners sewed on securely.

Belts that are guaranteed either washable or drycleanable according to the garment fabric.

Good workmanship pays dividends in greater satisfaction in attractiveness, proper fit, and longer wear.

What You Can Do With Condensed Soups in Cooking

Use condensed broth or consommé when a recipe calls for meat stock.

Casseroles become quick tricks when you use cream soups as a base sauce. For a sauce consistency, thin soup with one-fourth cup of water or milk.

Dilute condensed cream or cheese soup with one-fourth to one-half cup of water or milk and use for a sauce on vegetables.

To turn leftover meat or poultry and vegetables into an appetizing lunch or dish, com-

bine leftovers with a creamed vegetable or chicken soup and serve on a toasted bun or toast.

Some gelatin salads take on a new life in less time when you use a condensed soup.

If your Christmas shopping budget is low, plan to make inexpensive Raggedy Ann or Andy dolls. Favorites with young children, these dolls are washable . . . a feature you'll appreciate.

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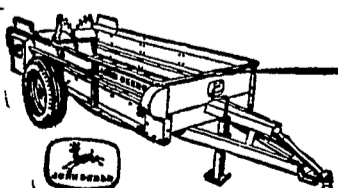

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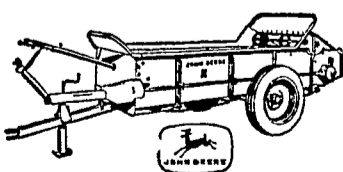
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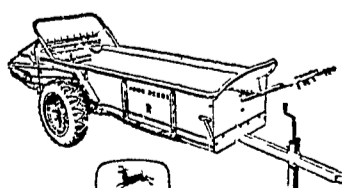
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
