

# Weekly Broiler Report

**Placements in Keystone State Decline**  
Placements of broiler chicks in the Keystone State during the week ending November 28, totaled 740,000 according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service. This was a decrease of 12 percent from the previous week and a decrease of 7 percent from a year ago. The 10-week total was 3 percent above the comparable period a year ago. Settings for broiler chicks, totaling 1,321,000 eggs, were 7 percent above the previous week and 10 percent above a year earlier. The 3-week total was 1 percent below last year. Inshipments of broiler-type chicks the past 10 weeks totaled 338,000 or 60 percent below the comparable period in 1963. Outshipments of 1,321,000 were down 20 percent.

Placements in the 22 major producing states, totaling 38,125,000 chicks, were about the same as the previous week but 1 percent below a year ago. The 10-week total was 3 percent above last year. Settings of 53,458,000 eggs were about the same as the previous week but 2 percent above a year ago. The 3 week total was about the same as a year ago.

and medium to good were a little lower.

At the horse sale on Nov. 30, a steady to active trend was noted on the 148 head offered. Riding horses sold for 125-185; driving horses, 125-240; killers, 5-5 $\frac{1}{2}$  cents per pound. Pony mares brought 30-85, and geldings 20-60. No mules were received.

The trend at the hog sale on Nov. 30 was 25-50 cents higher as 276 head were sold. Hogs retailed at 17.25-18; wholesale (U.S. 1-3), 16.25-17.25; heavyweights, 15.50-16.25. Sows sold for 11-14. No shoats were offered.

At the calf sale on Nov. 30, demand was steady for 160 head offered. Choice and prime brought 34-37.50; good and low choice, 26-33.50; standard, 20-26; common, 12-20.

## • Delmarva

The Delmarva broiler and fryer live prices declined over  $\frac{1}{4}$  cent with fair demand for moderately heavy auction offerings.

Ready-to-cook demand was spotty, ranging from mostly fair to good in instances where featured sales were a factor. Delivered prices were mostly  $\frac{1}{4}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$  cent higher in an unchanged range. Prices continued competitive with other production areas

Estimated slaughter for Friday and Saturday was 794,000 head compared with 774,000 head last weekend.

Prices paid and reported purchases for the 24-hour period ending 10 30 a.m. Friday Broilers and fryers, 12.9-14.7; 1,191,900 head, including 516,900 head purchased of 560,000 head offered at Eastern Poultry Growers Exchange Thursday.

Thirty percent of the broilers and fryers sold for 14-14.4 cents per pound.

The Delmarva broiler-feed ratio for the week ending November 27, 1964 was not available because of the Thanksgiving Day holiday.

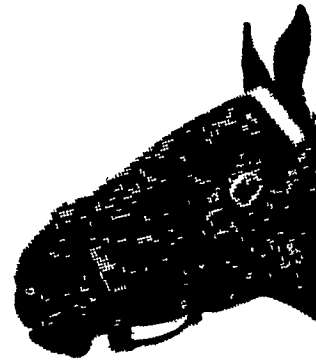
