C. J Hollister, the administrator of the Center, who briefly gave a history of the Center and the facilities. The Center is a part of the School of Veterinary Medicine of the University of Pennsylvania. It is maintained for teaching, research, and services to the public. Approximately three hundred and fifty acres are owned by the university and an additional two hundled and seventy acres are rented, giving a total of six hundred twenty acres.

Leucosis in poultry and livestock is closely related to leukemia in humans. A small flock of sheep, a small herd of swine, and a few horses are kept for research purposes.

With one exception, the facilities are financed by private endowment and not by state appropriations. The exception is the Poultry Diagnosite Laboratory, which is state supported.

The group was very interested in the operating rooms, the X-Ray room and facilities, and a room to be completed for Electro-cardiogram of the hearts of livestock for heart disease. An open fistula, used in studying the effects of different antibiotic action in the iumen attracted much attention. The view of the actual


