"Cycle" Laying Rations From HORNCO!

"Different Feeds For The Different The Laying Cycle." Periods

The correct ration is needed during this period to prevent excessive fat accumulation and to help-the bird produce up to her bred-in potential — USE HORNCO NO. 103 LAYER RATION C-3.
