Three other persons and an FFA Chapter were honored with certificates of merit for their conservation work and cooperation with the district agency. Edwin S. Fox, Ephrata, R3 farmer, Lewis Householder became one of the nation's best known dairy agriculture at Ephrata High School, Earl Robman, pioneer conservationist and a founder of the Conestoga Valley Association, and the Future Farmers of America, Solanco Chapter.

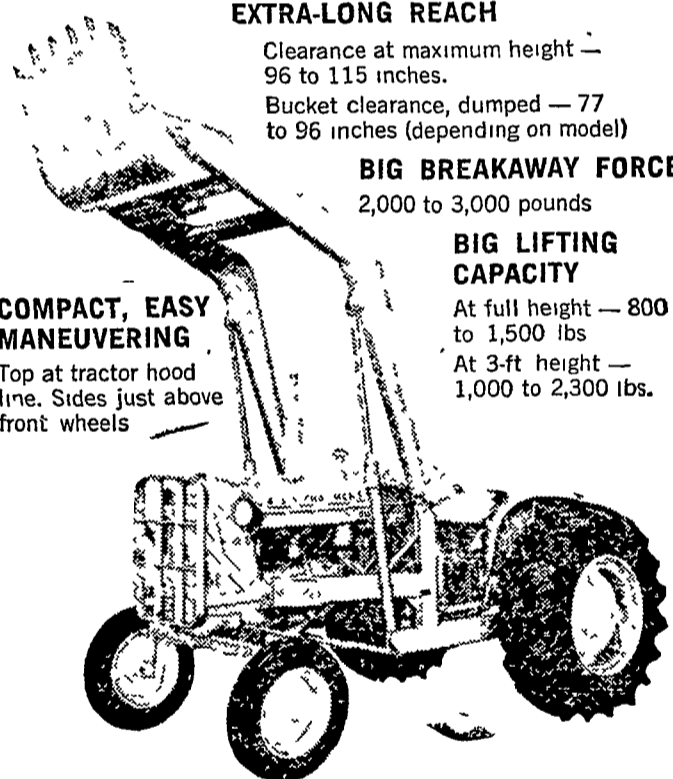
