creamy. Stir in a few drops of green food coloring. Spread over chilled crumb crust. Beat egg whites with salt until frothy. Add sugar gradually, beating until stiff peaks form. Pile lightly over cream filling, spreading to edges. Sprinkle with reserved crumbs. Place under broiler about 8 inches from heated unit, for only 1 minute until very lightly browned. Cut into squares to serve. Makes 9 servings.

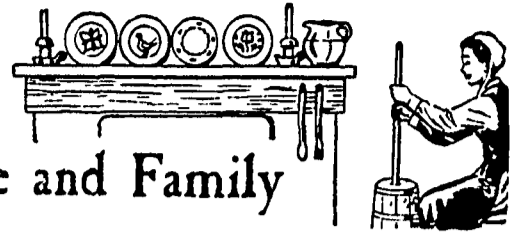

On his 46-acre farm in the New Holland area Sensenig has been practicing conservation for nine or ten years. He was one of the pioneers in this form of land management in his area. His contoured farm includes a grass waterway, a diversion terrace, and a one-half acre farm pond.
Sensenig explained that he first got interested in applying conservation practices through his son, who farms in the Manor Township area. "I was visiting down there one day when the Soil Conservation Service technicians were staking out contours," he told us. "First thing I knew my son and I were talking about using these on the home farm."

Things moved fast after that. He put conservation principles to work at home and soon became so sold on the results that he began talking "conservation" to his neighbors. Soon the District Directors found they needed a director in the New Holland area and asked Sensenig to accept the nomination. He was elected, and served two, four-year terms. He retired as a director in 1964 after completing his second term.

For many years the Sensenigs operated a retail store on the farm. About six years ago they built a modern supermarket across the highway from the farm. The farm itself is now rented out and the old store converted to two apartments. Sensenig still fattens and butchers steers at the farm, however. These are halved at the farm slaughterhouse, then transported to the store where they are cut up and sold. He moves about 150 steers per year in this way. Hogs are also slaughtered at the farm, but these are bought rather than raised. After their seven children had grown and left home, the Sensenigs rented out the old farmhouse and built the attractive modern home in which they now live along the farm lane.

Each year purchases by farmers include more than \$3 billion for new tractors, other motor vehicles, machinery and equipment.

Some New Way To Use Canned Bartlett Pears

Tempt your children's lagging appetites with a funny face pear salad. Drain canned pears, place a half — cut side down — on lettuce. Design a face with raisins, marshmallow cherries, coconut, nuts, or strips of cheese. Children may like to create their own funny face salads.
To serve with ham, chicken, roast pork or turkey, tint canned pear halves using cranberry juice. Pour the cranberry juice over the pears, heat but do not boil, then chill so pears can absorb the color and flavor of the cranberry juice. Pears will have a tangy and interesting flavor.

Add a grating of fresh ginger root, a few slices of crystallized ginger, or a pinch of ground ginger to canned pears. Simmer a few minutes, then serve as a go-with for the meat course.

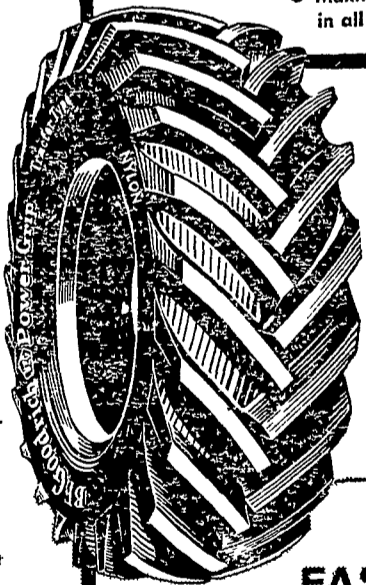

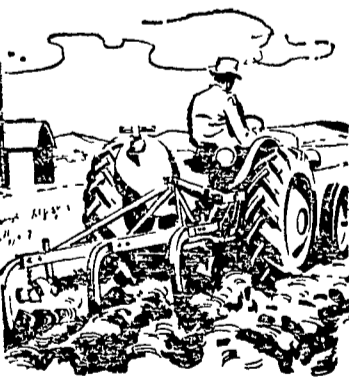

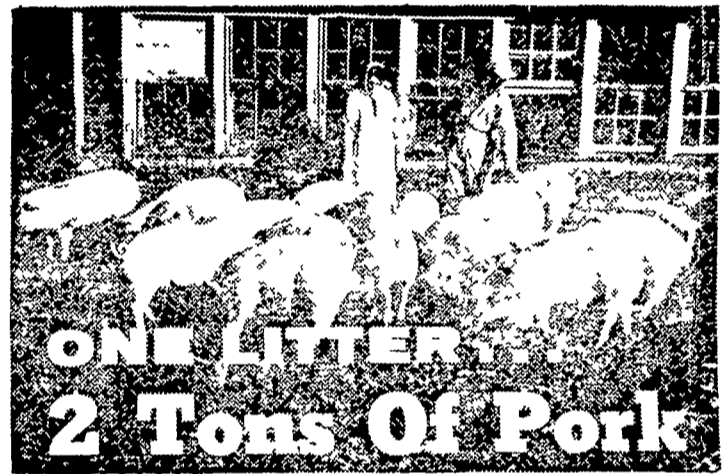
