ditions, McDaniel thinks production per farm and total agricultural output will be greater in the decade ahead than ever before. Income per farm will increase, but net income will increase at a slower rate than gross income. "Top management ability will be needed to squeeze the profit dollars out of a high gross income — high cost business."

An increase in land values will cause a continued shift to more intensive uses of crop acres. There will be less acres of pasture and low value crops and an intensification in the production of high income crops and livestock.

Two-thirds of all the tractors in the world are on U. S. farms, states Ray Hurley, chief, U. S. Census Bureau's Agriculture Division.

flies, this insecticide, used in the same manner, resulted in 95-percent control.

Although several methods are commonly used to control these pests, the researchers say that ronnel, fed in either block or granular salt mixtures, prove the simplest yet tested. The studies are designed to find the easiest and most economical methods of control.

The blood-sucking horn fly, which ranks as one of the worst pests of U.S. cattle,
