(Continued from Page 7) survey. This total is about the same as in 1964 but there are some dramatic shifts among crops. If growers carry out their plans for the 17 crops, and allowance is made for the other crops not surveyed in March, the indicated planted acreage of all crops totals 307 million acres for 1965, slightly more than last year's 306 million, but the third smallest planted acreage since records began in 1929. The record low is 301 million acres planted in 1961.

Of the spring planted crops, soybeans continue to lead in acreage expansion, 2.6 million acres above last year. Sorghum is second, increasing two-thirds of a million acres. Other crops with larger acre-

ages expected for 1965 are all show expected declines hay, potatoes, sweetpotatoes, about one-half million acres and dry beans. Oats leads the from 1964. Smaller acreage reduction decreasing 1.5 million acres, followed closely by flaxseed, spring wheat, sugar a 1.4 million acre decrease in beets, dry peas, rice, and barley. Cotton and corn each nuts.

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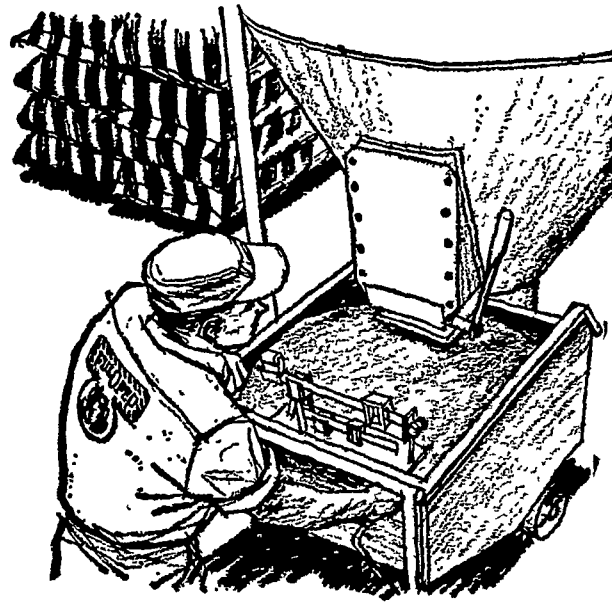
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
