The recipient receives an all-expense paid trip to the National FFA Convention in St. Louis, Missouri. The five boys being considered this year are: Glenn Weber and Dale Herr, both from Garden Spot High School; Tom Zarkin and Cliff Bollinger, both from Ephrata High School; and Earl Wenger, Solanco High School.

The teachers chose June 14 as the date for their soil profile workshop to be held at

Penn Manor High School. This is a one-day study of the procedures of taking soil samples and using them in teaching.

The County FFA hog show was tentatively scheduled for August 3rd, with about 150-200 head planned to be shown. A steering committee was appointed by Elvin S. Hess, president, to study the question of whether to have an agriculture teacher do the judging, or to bring in an outside judge such as a swine breeder or a packer. The committee was composed of Lewis Ayers, chairman; Clair Zerby; and Henry Givler.

cluded scheduling the meat judging contest for April 29, at Kunzler's, Lancaster; the milk products contest for April 28 at Ephrata High School; and the tractor driving contest to be held at York in the latter part of April or early May.

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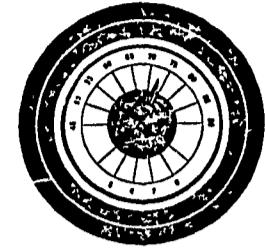
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
