BROILER PLACEMENTS DECLINE 1 PERCENT

Placements of broiler chicks taled 839,000, according to the paid Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service. The placements decreased 1 percent from the previous week but were 30 percent above a year ago. Settings for broiler chicks totaling 1,476,000 declined 1 percent from the previous week but were 28 percent above a year ago. The current 3-week total of eggs set increased 31 percent from last year. Inshipments of broiler-type during the past 10 totaled 805,000 or 142 percent above the comparable period a year earlier. Outshipments, 2,101,000, were 56 percent above the comparable period in 1964.
