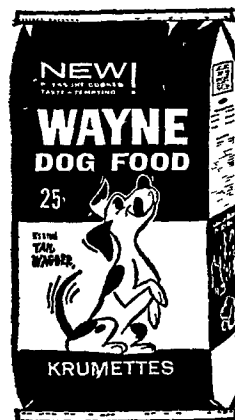

"The Beetles Are Coming," Says U.S. Agr. Dept.

As the Japanese beetle season approaches, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reminds farmers, homeowners, and commercial shippers that they may inadvertently help spread this pest to new areas if they fail to follow quarantine regulations.

Each spring, adult Japanese beetles emerge to begin their annual attack on fruit, flowers, and farm produce. Despite the millions of dollars spent by farmers and homeowners to combat them, the beetles cause widespread damage to many horticultural and farm crops.

USDA's Agricultural Research Service points out that state and federal quarantines to prevent further spread of this destructive pest now cover an area extending from Atlanta, Ga., to Bangor, Me., and New York City to South Bend, Ind.

Quarantine regulations prohibit the movement of soil and nursery stock outside the infested area until they are treated and a certificate is attached to the shipment. In addition, other articles such as farm produce, railroad cars, airplanes, and trucks, which might spread the beetle, are subject to treatment if an inspector determines that a hazard exists.

Each summer during the adult beetle flight season, quarantine inspectors step up their activities at transportation depots and other potentially hazardous sites to prevent spread to noninfested parts of the country. The inspector works with the owner or operator to eliminate any hazards found; it also may be necessary to treat the product, carrier, or environs to kill adult beetles, before they can hitchhike to another area.
