

**Limestone Institute Promotes Conservation**

In recent appearances before the House and Senate Subcommittees on Appropriations for Agriculture, President Koch complimented the Committees on their foresight in the past in maintaining the Agricultural Conservation Program at its present level of \$250 million. They have consistently opposed the Bureau of the Budget recommendations to cut conservation funds. The Bureau once again advocated a cut of \$100 million in the program. He pointed up that the conservation gains of the

past three decades could not have been made without the partnership arrangement where the Federal Government shares the cost of carrying out the conservation measures with the farmers. He said:

"Since its inception, the ACP has amassed an astounding record of accomplishments and has enhanced the face of rural America through its cost-sharing partnership with the farmer. Farmers, with ACP help, have built enough terracing to reach the moon seven times and enough sod waterways to go around this planet a dozen times! This fact alone is impressive.

However, they have also planted a tree for every human being on the earth and constructed two million ponds! Over 720 million acres of vegetable cover have been established, and 95 million acres of established cover have been improved. All of these things have been accomplished in partnership, and there remains much more to be done; and yet, we find ourselves here today having to defend this Program from a \$100 million reduction"

The testimony included a tabulation of requests for cost-sharing received by County Committees from farmers which revealed that over two-thirds of the requests in one state could not be approved. In several states, over half of the requests were turned down in 1964.

While the basic legislation authorizes \$500 million annually for this program, Koch asked the committee to "do all in your power to maintain the ACP authorization for the 1966 Program at \$250 million" He also reminded the Committee that any funds authorized for the program should be justified in the National interest and not as aid to a particular industry.

You'll find a good range of flavors to choose from in cheddar cheese, or American cheese as it is sometimes called. Depending on how long the cheese has been aged, cheddar flavors vary from mild to sharp.

To change the flavor of cheddar cheese, some cheesemakers add sage, pimento, or other ingredients to the cheese before ripening

When planning meals, cheese

anks as a top quality protein food, a nutritious alternate for meat Cheese is also a good source of calcium and riboflavin, two important nutrients.

Use cheese as is or in combination with other foods, such as in soups, casseroles, toppings for meat and fish dishes, omelets, cakes, and pastries

Cheese is much too good to waste so use every bit of it. Cheddar cheese will keep well in the refrigerator for a few weeks if protected from mold contamination and drying out

When possible, leave the original wrapper on the cheese to protect the surface from drying out But if Cheddar dries out and becomes hard, grate and keep it in a clean jar with a tight-fitting lid You can find many uses for grated cheese, such as for garnishes and accents

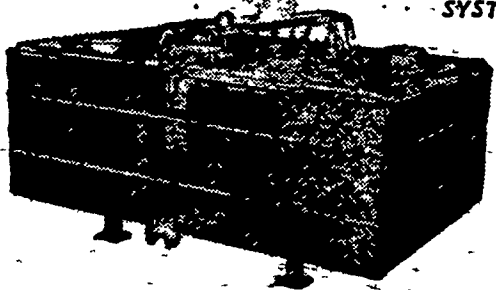

en egg white. Stir in oranges and walnuts. Pour into 4 1/2 cup ring mold Refrigerate 4 to 5 hours or until firm. Meanwhile, toss apples in orange juice. Add chicken and cheese. Beat cranberry sauce with a whisk or spoon. Stir in mayonnaise, whipped cream and salt. Add to chicken salad and combine thoroughly. Refrigerate, covered, for at least 1 hour. To serve, unmold cranberry ring onto lettuce lined serving plate. Fill center with chicken salad. (Serve remaining salad in a separate dish.) Garnish with a sprinkling of chopped parsley. Makes 6 servings

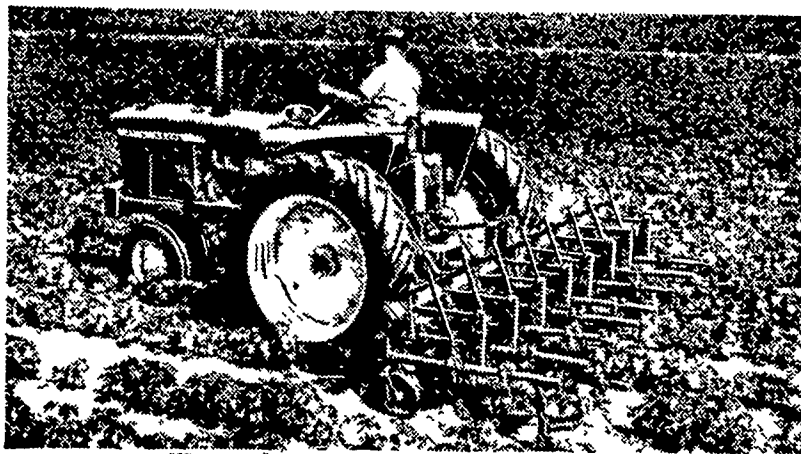
